

## Roald Dahl

Many of you may have already seen the movie *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory* which was shown in a lot of cinemas all over Germany in summer 2005. However, what do you know about its author, Roald Dahl?

Well, Roald Dahl was born on 13 September 1916 in Llandaff, Wales. He is known as the author of short stories and children's books and has also written autobiographies, novels and poetry. Probably his most famous collection of short stories are *Kiss, Kiss* (*Küsschen, Küsschen* in German) and *Someone Like You* (*Noch ein Küsschen*), and among his children's books *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory*, *The Gremlins*, *James and the Giant Peach* or *Danny, the Champion of the World* have to be mentioned.

- 1 Roald Dahl's father, Harald Dahl, was from
  - Norway (L)
  - Wales (M)
- 2 Elmtree House was the name of the
  - local school in Llandaff (Y)
  - home of the Dahl family in Llandaff (B)
- 3 When Roald was seven years old, his mother sent him to
  - St Peter's, an English boarding school (C)
  - Llandaff Cathedral School (W)

- 4 After the Dahl family had moved to Kent, Roald was sent off to Repton Public School. He was thirteen by that time. Now and again each pupil at Repton was given a grey cardboard box as a present by the Cadbury company. These boxes contained
