**Teacher's notes** 

#### Preparation:

Copy the worksheet for each student or pair of students.

#### In class:

Before giving the worksheet to the students, ask them in pairs or small groups to think of as many things as possible that you can do with a mobile phone. Ask them to list these and then collect all the ideas in class. It does not matter how silly the ideas are! You could use a mobile phone as a paperweight or to throw at someone!

Hand out the worksheet. Students can add their own ideas to the list on the worksheet.

Carry out a class survey. Make sure students know how to write the appropriate questions and answers for the survey: *Do you use your mobile to go on the Internet? Yes, sometimes. / No, never.* Give examples or write them on the board if necessary.

Divide up all the ideas among the students, individually or in pairs. Let the students choose the four ideas they like best. Students fill in the table with these ideas and then find out how often members of the class do these things. They report back using sentences such as: *10 people never use their mobile to find the way*.

Collect the results of the survey on the board. What is the most surprising result?
